"MAGA" WINS BUT SO DO OUR WAYNE AND PASSAIC COUNTY CANDIDATES

Harris falls short but all other Democrats on the Passaic County ticket sweep!

Surprised? Angry? Depressed? Scared? There was no shortage of words to describe our feelings as the night wore on, and it became clear from the election results that it was going to be a long one for Democrats. And it was. Kamla Harris and Tim Walz went down to defeat, and the "red wave" ended up giving Republicans control of both the Senate and the House. What that means for our country as we live though the next four years is reason enough to feel all of those feelings, and also a good reason why we need to talk about it at our next meeting on November 25th.

But, as bad as that was, there was good news here in Wayne as all of our other Democrats on Row A of our ballot swept to victory. Andy Kim led the way, running a campaign free of PAC money and successfully challenging the use of "The Line" in New Jersey politics. Kim wins the seat vacated by Robert Menendez. Meanwhile, our candidates for the House finished strong, incumbent Mikie Sherrill handily winning a fourth term in CD11 by 14 points, and first-time CD9 candidate Nellie Pou winning the seat left vacant with Bill Pascrell's passing. And our Passaic County candidates finished things off, Tommy Adamo succeeding the late Richard Berdnik as Passaic County's Sheriff, and incumbent Commissioners Sandi Lazzara and John Bartlett being re-elected. Newcomer Rodney De Vore joined Lazzara and Bartlett in the winners circle, filling out the trifecta for the Passaic County Commissioners. So...feeling better? You should be, but regardless of how you feel, there could be no worse time to "throw up your hands".

Once again, let's talk about it at our next meeting!

On November 18th, Representative Mikie Sherrill confirmed the "worst kept secret" and announced that she will be running to become the next Governor of NJ, replacing Governor Phil Murphy whose term expires in 2026. The news came on the heels of Josh Gottheimer, CD5's representative in the House, also declaring his candidacy. That brings the total of Democrats running for Governor to six! (Can you name them? Our Township Master Plan has been reexamined over the years. This current update started in August 2024 and will be an 18-month process, according to the Township's website.

Three public sessions are scheduled throughout December: two in-person and one virtual meeting.

The township administration is querying residents through an online survey through three timeframes: September-December 2024, February-April 2025 and June-August 2025.
